feelings known on planning matters before they go on to the district council".

Mrs Clark has lived in Gosberton for 23 years, and that time she has seen considerable changes.

"When I came to Wargate Way there were only 17 houses, now there are more than 40.

"That sort of thing has been happening all over Gosberton — there had been a tremendous growth.

"But despite that development, there is relatively little big business in the area, although we have a good assortment of corner shops.

"We have butchers and bakers, in fact just about everything but a candlestick maker", she said.

The council, which meets every six weeks, includes members from the village and Clough and Risegate wards.

"We have done a lot of work in the village over the years, but perhaps one of our most important achievements was buying the playing field.

"It took a long time because there was something of a legal wrangle, but we managed to get it in the end.

"Now there are swings, see-saws and a roundabout for the children to enjoy whenever they want.
